More "Sleeping Police Officers" to be Installed Campus Wide

British United Technologies (BUT), in cooperation with St. Lawrence Safety and Security has developed a system of what the British call "sleeping police officers" around campus to decrease speeding on campus. The sleeping police officers, known in the U.S. as speed bumps, will be installed on outer Romoda Drive near Main Street, on University Avenue and on Park Street. According to Marge Thacker, Chief Executive of BUT; "the new sleeping police officers will cause damage to the boot of your car by raising it up on a lift and then slamming it down again." The technique has been a proven speed stopper in Britain as 21.6% of all cars getting caught by the sleeping police officers have suffered severe damage. The only disadvantage of this program is that police officers need to sleep on the side of the road 24 hours per day in order to control the device. Currently, BEP is working on plans to make an automated system; but right now St. Lawrence Security, says it is up to BUT to make the first move before the University goes to an automated system.
