Journal (Taita) Day one

1/29/98 Friday. Day one of the Taita homestay. Started with a 9 hour drive to Taita. We observed a great change in climate, from the more temperate cool regions of Nairobi to the warmer, drier lowlands. Along the bumpy roads towards Taita we saw the first images of Kilimajaro. A spectacular site, it looked almost like a cloud in the sky. The road and land were clearly marked by the effects of El Nino. Trucks overturned, potholes and an unseasonable green marked the journey.

Arrival in Taita around 3:30 saw us drive into the Taita hills. At the school we were greeted by Davis and David and introduced to our host families. There I met the Mwangombe's of Abu Man, Charles and Barisa. Charles and Barisa then walked me up to our home in Wasera. I noticed the intense vegetation of the mountain region. We arrived in the steep hills of Wasera after a 30 minute walk. Charles and Barisa both speak very good English and we started discussing culture differences ~~not~~ from the beginning. They pointed ~~out~~ many plants and crops along the way and seem to be very good teachers.

After a meal of ugali and greens we went to bed around 10:30.

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Journal (Taita) Day Two

11/27/1988 Wake-up around 7:00 am ~~then~~ was followed by a breakfast of ~~the~~ mKale and Chai. At 9:30 I helped Abu and Benisa separate the maize from its shell by pounding it with a grinding type stick. After about 20 minutes of work, ~~the~~ The maize was ready for drying and later ground into maize flour.

At 10:30 ~~we~~ Charles and I started ~~the~~ our ~~the~~ 2 and $\frac{1}{2}$ hour walk for the Market. Upon Arrival Along the way we saw and greeted many people. At the Market Charles showed me the products being sold from food stuffs to clothes and building materials. I noticed the social gathering associated with the Market as people from all over Taita came not only to shop, but to socialize. At 1:30 after shopping we stopped for lunch of Chapati and beans at a hotel. For about 40 shillings (less than 1\$) Charles and I ate. At 2:30 we took a Matatu back ~~to~~ home for about 60 Shillings. I noticed due to no set prices, there is a great disparity in the range of prices for goods. At one hotel Chapati's were 25 Shillings and at another, they were only 10. Arrived home around 5:00 for a meal of Maize and Beans. ~~There~~ During the day there were many discussions on subjects ranging from school to government. I noticed the word Mzungu (white man) used quite often. It gave me the real feeling of what it is like to be a minority.
