Semester in Kenya

This is the first in a series outlining the Semester in Kenya. The morning after arriving in Nairobi the group packed off to Lake Naivasha for three days of orientation and to climb Mt. Longonot. At orientation we met our professors and got a better idea of what the next four months of the semester would entail. The following is an outline of those months with in-depth descriptions to be provided in upcoming editions of the Hill News.

First month, 1) orientation, 2) Rural Homestays — each student is placed in a home in a village west of Nairobi in order to partake in the day to day life of a Kenyan farming community. 3) Urban Homestays — students begin a month-long stay with families in and around Nairobi. 4) Group excursion to Maasai Mara or Amboseli Game reserve, 5) Classes being — classes are six weeks long with plenty of time for individual travel. Second month, Samburu Field Experience — students spent two

weeks in Samburuland, led by biologist and Samburu elder Michael Rainy. Third month, 1) Classes end, 2) Internships begin — they range from delivering babies to working for General Motors. Fourth month, 10 days free travel — different trips are arranged by the director and assistant director to different parts of Kenya not accessible within the length of the weekend. The semester in Kenya is a fast paced one with emphasis on experimental learning.
